Sue Jarrett

It is with tremendous sadness that we start this issue reporting the untimely death of our long-time Chair, Sue Jarrett. Sue has been the driving force behind ESCA for many years, indeed before

I arrived in the Eatons twenty years ago, and without her tireless efforts we would have far fewer of the things you see each issue. Whether it was planning and organising public events such as May Day, defibrilators being installed on public buildings (Sue on the right), benches (Sue seated in the centre), planting bulbs in public places each autumn, improving the planters near Bushmead School or clearing out Bunny Lane, Sue was invariably involved somehow. And yet she never set out to be the local heroine – almost every picture of her I have shows her surrounded by groups of smiling volunteers, all proud to be part of a thriving community association making life better for all its residents.





Sue's impact was much wider than ESCA, though; as a teacher she was well known in the Eatons; as a local historian she had an encyclopaedic knowledge of the area and a vast collection of material tracing the evolution of the community which she exhibited regularly - much of which you can see here - as well as leading guided tours of the Eatons. She was a long standing Trustee of the Eaton Socon Charities, and one of the original Trustees of the Pightle, where she would regularly hold activities to introduce primary school children to their natural surroundings.

Sue had a remarkable ability to get everyone to pull together for the common good, including local councillors of all persuasions, and ESCA under her leadership took on the challenge of assisting people and community groups who fell under the radar of officialdom. Money raised from May Day, Open Gardens and other events would always head back into community projects to make a real difference to people's quality of life. Sue's contribution to life in the Eatons really is incalculable. We believe that keeping ESCA healthy and achieving as much as we can in the same spirit is the least we can do to honour her memory.

If you are hungry then you could qualify for the Food Bank. You

will need a voucher and these can be obtained from Bushmead or Crosshall School, your Housing Association, Eaton Socon Health Centre, Pre Schools, The Children's Centre in Bushmead Road, Social Services or your Support Worker. Failing any of these you can obtain a voucher from the CAB in Tan Yard car park near Waitrose or the St. Neots Locality Team in The Bargroves, Cromwell Road.

Vouchers can then be exchanged for sufficient food for 3 days at these distribution centres -


Textile Bank

If you haven't found it yet, Sudbury Meadow is on Crosshall Road, Eaton Ford, sandwiched between Cavendish Court and Regatta Meadow. In common with all the local green spaces, it has become more popular this year as people look for places to enjoy outside. With seats spread around the site and a mixture of meadow, orchard and gardens, it is a small haven for wildlife and people.

Although the site is owned by Huntingdonshire District Council, it is managed by Friends of Sudbury Meadow and a small, but enthusiastic team of volunteers. The latter have been challenged this year, as has everyone in conservation, with trying to keep the site useable and keeping themselves safe. We have been incredibly lucky that several married couples and individuals were able to work on site on their own and kept gardens, hedges and grass tidy during the first lockdown. Work parties started again in July with social distancing and the understanding that if someone gets Covid-19, we all have to self-isolate for 14 days. So far we have been lucky.

So if you go to Sudbury Meadow this winter what can you expect to see? Well plenty of birds in the hedgerows to start with. Goldfinches, blue tits, great tits, a few greenfinches, robins and wrens to name but a few. You may be lucky to see a Muntjac deer too. There are also small rodents around although they are not easy to spot. Grey squirrels are easier to see and will be looking for their stashed nuts and seeds. We have had to coppice quite a few of the hazel shrubs, but keep your eyes open for early catkins from January.

We are really keen to enlist the help of more able-bodied and preferably knowledgeable volunteers, particularly if they are under 60. So if you enjoy working outside and are used to handling gardening tools, do get in touch to see if you can help us. There is always the option to join Friends of Sudbury Meadow too, which will help to support the site for the future. More details on our website www. sudburymeadow.org.uk or call 01480 472624. Eaton Socon Trefoil Guild In 2019 we have tried Salsa Dancing; ate freshly






