Ever wished to know about life in Cow Lane, Peppercorns Lane and School Lane or Ackerman Street, Woods Lane and Mill Lane then this year's booklet may answer some of those questions. Focusing on the lanes that make up the old village centre of Eaton Socon this years history booklet includes information on the Millers Arms, the Falcon Pub, the Cock Pub (later the Manor House) the glove factory, the River Mill, the Eaton Socon Academy, River Farm and lots more. Read about the Thody family who farmed some of the land for over 100 years, the Peppercorn family at The Manor House, the Hobson family at the Mill, the vicar's family who built a house near Castle Hill and lots more.

Or, if you have family that has lived here for several generations the Burials booklet is now available. This lists people who were buried in Eaton Socon Churchyard from 1813 - 2002.

All these booklets are available in the St Neots Reference Library and the County Archives offices in Bedford and Huntingdon.

The ESCA books are written by ESCA for anyone with an interest in the Eatons. All profits are used to support ESCA projects within the Eatons and no profits go to Committee members.

Blue Plaques

As we go to print the blue plaques have been approved and have been ordered. We are the first group in this area to have heritage boards and a group of blue plaques so we should feel privileged. Our heritage in the Eatons is unique – having the Great North Rd running through the parish, beerhouses and coaching inns such as the White Horse and the Cock Pub, the Union Workhouse, industries such as the basket weavers and the Eaton Socon Brewery. It is great to see so many people reading the boards and soon the plaques will be in place. When they appear leaflets will be available in the Museum and Library to show the position of the boards and plaques.

Sudbury Meadow

A quick reminder that Sudbury Meadow is on Crosshall Road, a few metres from The Barley Mow pub, next to Regatta Meadow. It is open all the time. The padlocks on the gates are for Radar key holders to unlock and swing the gate wide open for wheelchairs or motorised buggies. The rest of us lift the latch! Please keep to the footpaths, either gravel or mown grass, so that the plants and animals are not disturbed.

We were delighted to receive another seat in January, donated by members of the Rotary Club, St Neots St Mary's. Many thanks to you all for this. It is already being used and should be a good place to sit and watch the bird life in the meadow.

We have an alien amongst us! Last autumn, we found two Harlequin Ladybirds at Sudbury Meadow. These foreign insects have received a lot of publicity lately. We are looking for extra volunteers to take on recording the ladybirds at Sudbury Meadow, so that we can monitor the progress of the newcomers. The survey is part of the national one, being run from the Biological Records Centre at Monks Wood. Do get in touch if you would like to help.

Finally, thank you to all dog walkers who clear up after their dogs at Sudbury Meadow. Not only does it make it more pleasant for visitors, but also for those of us working on site.

Eaton Socon Youth Cricketers

The history of Eaton Socon Cricket Club is long and chequered. Cricket has been played in Eaton Socon for over 150 years, being a big social event for the whole village. One of the earliest sites for the club was in the garden of Eaton house, owned by the Wilkinson family, which is currently used by Radio Links. The first game was held there in 1855, on a Tuesday afternoon, Tuesdays being half-day shop closing, thus enabling the local tradesmen and shopkeepers to take part.

The cricket ground was moved to various places in the village over the years, ending up from 1936 at the current site off Peppercorns Lane, on land owned by the McNish family, next to the Pightle. This is the little haven of peace where cricket matches take place at weekends during the summer. It is not just men hitting a ball with a bat for a few hours, but a

social scene that involves the whole family. There is nothing nicer than sitting in the sun watching cricket on a warm Sunday afternoon, glass in hand, watching your husband or son (or daughter!) play a game that is both entertaining and civilised, where no-one argues with the Umpire. The membership of the cricket club often contains grandfathers, sons and grandchildren of the same families all contributing to and enjoying the Club.

The importance of youth development was first highlighted in the 50's, when a Youth Team was founded. However, in the 90's, certain far-sighted and dedicated members realised that the future of the club, and cricket in general, lay in promoting youth cricket and retaining the colts within the club, introducing them to men's cricket. As a result, Eaton Socon now has Youth teams at U11, U13 and U15 ages, which are all forces to be reckoned with. Many young players have gone on to County level cricket. Currently, over 50 children, boys and girls, from 8 to 15, attend cricket training sessions. Eaton Socon has two men's teams, and in 2006, a Youth development team was successfully formulated to give promising youngsters an introduction to adult cricket.

To encourage the children to practise, Eaton Socon Cricket Club wants to replace the old, unusable cricket nets with new Astroturf nets. Unfortunately, these will cost around £12,000 to rebuild. To raise this amount, the Club are holding many fundraising events, including a Race Night and various sponsored events to be carried out by the children. 


St Neots Camera Club Exhibition

Sale of the Cock Pub in 1845

With the coming of the railways travel on the Great North Rd became less attractive and the coaching inns lost some of their visitors. While some of the smaller inns in Eaton Socon survived Henry Walker at the Cock Pub went bankrupt. It was said at the bankruptcy court that 'the misfortunes which have befallen him have arisen from no misconduct of his own, but simply from the sad reverses of his business, occasioned by the establishment of the Rail Roads'. The freehold estate was mortgaged for £2,500 and the estimated value was now only £1,000.

In September 1845 the fixtures and fittings of the building were sold over several days and the sale document is a small booklet detailing all the items. Seventeen bedrooms were noted – including a Balloon Bedroom, a Chintz Bedroom, Sun Bedroom, dressing rooms, a London Sitting room, a York Sitting Room, an Oxford Sitting Room, a Dolphin Room, store rooms, a compact brewery, a wine cellar, a beer cellar and lots more. The sale included 470 ounces of plate. 94 pairs of sheets, 160 tablecloths and 40 feather beds.

So what happened to the Cock Pub – it was sold to a Mr Peppercorn who then

named the property The Manor House and it became a family home for many years. In the mid 1960's it was demolished and several houses were built on the land - now Manor House Close at the entrance to Peppercorns Lane.

Proud to be Loud (P2BL)

The innovative Proud to be Loud (P2BL) holiday scheme runs along the lines the children and young people want. This means that from day one, organisers sit down with them at the end of the day to ask what they liked and what was not so good. Every day is tweaked based on the comments received from the day before. And every holiday the scheme runs, the programme is amended from the previous one so that it is even more relevant. This active participation by users in deciding what activities to run, has led to a scheme that is popular and attracts the same faces back each time. One thing that is always popular is using hammer beads to make iron-on pictures, and there is an increasing move towards girls' only football. Often boys are so proficient at football that the girls may welcome some protected time to hone their skills in the sport.

Haysha Buss (age 12) says "It's a great way to socialise, meet new people and have fun. Plus your parents get some time off."

P2BL is an open access scheme, meaning you have to book up on a 'first come first serve' basis, but it also aims to offer places to those families who most need support. Not everyone can afford the usual options for childcare during school holidays, which can be a real problem for working parents. Therefore, organisers will be looking to offer places for children and young people who are not occupied during the day. If you find yourself worrying about where your children can go where they will enjoy the school holidays, without spending and arm and a leg, get in touch to book your place. This free scheme is open to all children and young people between the ages of 10 and 14 years in St Neots and surrounding villages.

The scheme is funded from a variety of sources and benefits from the support of key organisations such as Huntingdonshire District Council, Cambridgeshire County Council, St Neots Town Council, Luminus and Cambridgeshire Constabulary. Staff or money from these organisations is provided in recognition of the importance of providing holiday activities for this age group.
