Booklet News and Reviews

Two new booklets were produced in May and June. In May the long awaited book on the Village Lanes was available and if you would like to know about life in Cow Lane, Peppercorns Lane and School Lane or Ackerman Street, Woods Lane and Mill Lane then this years booklet may answer some of those questions. More than 180 pages focus on the lanes that make up the old village centre of Eaton Socon. This year's history booklet includes information on the Millers Arms, the Falcon Pub, the Cock Pub (later the Manor House) the glove factory, the River Mill, the Eaton Socon Academy, River Farm and lots more. Read about the Thody family who farmed some of the land for over 100 years, the Peppercorn family at The Manor House, the Hobson family at the Mill, the vicar's family who built a house near Castle Hills and lots more.

In June the Church celebrated 75 years since its rebuilding and rededication in June 1932 after the disastrous fire that destroyed the church in February 1930. For the celebration the fire booklet was revised with new pictures and more information kindly researched by Rosemary Galloway. So a big Thank You is given to Rosemary who retyped the booklet while Sue was compiling the Lanes booklet. The new booklet is named 'Recalling 75 years On'.

All these booklets are available in the St Neots Reference Library and the County Archives offices in Bedford and Huntingdon.

The ESCA books are written by ESCA for anyone with an interest in the Eatons. All profits are used to support ESCA projects within the Eatons and no profits go to Committee members.

Sudbury Meadow by Alison Pearson

What a strange year we are having! More rain than we know what to do with in some parts and temperatures fluctuating so much that the more tender vegetables are sulking. At Sudbury Meadow we are definitely being challenged! However, the volunteers pulled out all the stops for the St Neots in Bloom judging, on 12th July, and managed to present a reasonably well-kept set of gardens, though the grass had to wait for its cut.

The wet weather prevented the upper meadow from being cut in late June as the ground was too soft for the machinery. We will probably wait until after 1st August now, before we cut the whole meadow, adopting the traditional cutting time of a Lammas meadow. This will allow our summer flowers to set seed. Unfortunately, it will also allow the bindweed, which is smothering most of Sudbury Meadow, to set seed too. Bindweed seems to have been flourishing in the green corridor over the last few years and is proving to be a real nuisance in the gardens and shrubbery at Sudbury Meadow.

Butterfly numbers seem to be well down this year. A few Gatekeepers and Ringlets emerged in mid-July, but nothing like the numbers of the last two years. We hope this is due to the weather and not our management of the grassland. Slugs and snails on the other hand, have been so prolific that we have lost most of the vegetables and many of the summer bedding that we planted. Hopefully both Song Thrushes and hedgehogs will benefit from this extra food supply.

We hope you enjoy visiting Sudbury Meadow. Look out for new shrub signs later in the year, as we start developing on-site wildlife information.

Eatons Blue Plaques

During the summer twelve blue plaques arrived in Eaton Socon and Eaton Ford. The first one to be unveiled was the plaque to Matthew Rosamond. At a special ceremony to mark the 150th anniversary of the event that won him the prestigious Victoria Cross Eatons residents, members of the St Neots and Eaton Socon British Legion, members of the Rosamond family, Bob Eaton the Mayor of St Neots, newspaper reporters and Anglia Television stood on Eaton Socon Green on 4th June 2007.



The ceremony began with a welcome by Sue Jarrett, chairman of the Eatons Community Association. David Bushby, who had researched Matthew Rosamond, then told everyone a little about Matthew's life. Born in Eaton Socon in 1823, he left England as a teenager following the death of his father to join the army. In 1857 he was involved in the Indian Mutiny, where on several occasions he showed his bravery. On one occasion he volunteered to light fires in order to drive back the Indian soldiers and on another occasion he helped to rescue a paymaster and his family from their bungalow and take them to safety. He was awarded the Victoria Cross by Queen Victoria in 186. David commented - "I wonder what Matthew must have felt like having risen from such a humble background to meeting Queen Victoria, foreign ambassadors and ministers, lords, bishops, British and India Army officials including General Lord Clyde, on his return from

The unveiling of the plaque was carried out by members of the Rosamond family Frederick, Peter and a younger Matthew. Sue Jarrett said: "Matthew Rosamond's name and achievement, once forgotten, will once again be remembered and honoured. The plaque has been placed on Regis House, opposite St Mary's Church, Eaton Socon, where the former bakery was once run by the Rosamond family.

The second blue plaque to be revealed in the Eatons and the first blue plaque to be placed on a building was the Anderson's Blue Plaque marking the only place left in the Eatons where a shop has stood for over 200 years. In 1800 the Flawn family had a blacksmiths shop on this site and when the Flawn family left the Peck family opened a butchers shop which was then taken over by Vic Anderson. Vic's son Justin continues the tradition of a thriving village shop with a welcoming smile and news from around the village.

The remaining ten blue plaques commemorate local industries and places and can be found in the Eatons.

ESCA is the first group to have put up a set of plaques and boards in the district so we should be proud of our achievements. Leaflets are available at St Neots Museum and Library for the location of the boards and plaques, and new village trails. The plaques are part of the Eatons People and Places Project which has been funded by a grant from the St Neots Town Council, the Huntingdonshire Local History Society, the Rotary Club of St Neots St Mary's and a Local Heritage Initiative Grant.
