News from the Pightle

THE PIGHTLE MILLENIUM GREEN

On behalf of the Trustees I would like to extend a warm thanks to Joan Foley for the hard work and effort she (with some help from husband, Roy) has put into the Pightle during the eight years she spent as chair. Joan has decided to resign as chair and I am left with the unenviable task of trying to fill her shoes. Fortunately Joan is remaining on the board of Trustees and has agreed to support me through my first year as Chair.

I would also like to thank the other Trustees for making me welcome and passing on their knowledge about the Pightle its flora and fauna, its history and that of Eaton Socon. Every time I talk to one of the Trustees I realise the steep learning curve I have ahead of me; in respect of running a charity and helping to manage the land.

Although my family have used the Pightle most days for the last 8 years I have only been involved with the Pightle Committee for the last two years; taking over the Chair in May 2010. I was recently reflecting on the changing use my family have made of the Pightle over the last decade. When my children were younger we used the Pightle occasionally for fishing, playing space men on the rocket (old tree seat) or playing soldiers, or hide and seek in the trees. Getting a dog (Harry) eight years ago meant we started using the Pightle more regularly as it became his short walk of the day. We then began meeting more people out walking their dogs, and somewhere to think through problems, or 'to do lists'. Walking round somewhere daily you begin to notice things, some are pleasing such as a particular clump of flowers, tree buds forming/flowering and some are not so pleasing such as the paths becoming overgrown, having to duck brambles.

It was through meeting Joan that I became aware that though there is some funding from the council which goes towards paying for the grass cutting/clearing etc and insurance requirements, it is predominantly volunteers that manage the land; arranging for the paths to be cut and who take the time to cut back the brambles, plant new trees, pick up the rubbish, clear away tents etc. Unfortunately many of the original people who helped with the general maintenance work are now getting older and are unable to do the amount of work that they were once able to. This has left the Pightle with a shortage of people willing to lend a hand, which we desperately need in order to maintain the Pightle in its current state.

If you, like myself, use the Pightle and would like to get involved we would be very grateful for any support you can offer. Whether you would like to remain an anonymous helper and pick up any rubbish, or take a pair of secateurs on your walk and cut back any overhanging brambles. Maybe you could commit to one of the tidy ups we have twice a year where some of the bigger jobs are tackled. Or perhaps you can see a task that needs tackling but would rather work on your own in your own time at your own pace. - · Feed lawn with Nitrogen slow release fertiliser
- Spray lawn with selective herbicide (only if warm enough)
- Mow lawn regularly and lightly. Don't cut shorter than 3/4 inches (2 cm) this month. Grass will respond better if cut little and often.

3Bs at Sudbury Meadow!

It was meant to be **B**ees, **B**utterflies and a **B**ig Lunch picnic at Sudbury Meadow on 17th July, but the cool breeze and heavy showers suggested an alternative of bees, beer and the Barley Mow! Butterflies were reluctant to feed in such conditions, as they need sunshine and a temperature of around 21°C to be warm enough to fly. However, there were plenty of bumblebees to intrigue the dozen or so people who came along to help celebrate Sudbury Meadow's tenth year.

Bumblebees are fascinating insects. They are able to shiver to warm themselves up, so can fly in much cooler conditions than honeybees. There are six common species (Common Carder, Red-tailed, White-tailed, Buff-tailed, Early and Garden) and a potential seventh, the Tree Bumblebee. This species has only been recorded in this country since 2001, but is already becoming common in gardens. It prefers to nest in holes in trees and is quite a large bumblebee. Friends of Sudbury Meadow members, John and Lin Collier, have a Tree Bumblebee nest in their garden and we also found a specimen at Sudbury Meadow on 17th July (See picture right).

There are many more species of bumblebee and hundreds of solitary bee in the UK. You can find them feeding on flowers in your garden as well as at conservation sites, so it is well worth investing a little money on a good guide book and taking some time out from your busy lives to look for these fascinating insects.

Of course, you could go one step further and help us look after Sudbury Meadow too. You are welcome to come along to our regular work parties and help us, help our local wildlife. If you still don't know where Sudbury Meadow is, aim for the Barley Mow pub on Crosshall Road, Eaton Ford, (great for post work party refreshments!) look for the tall Lombardy Poplar trees almost opposite and behind them is Sudbury Meadow.

SPEAKABILITY HUNTINGDON

There are an estimated 300,000 people in the UK who are suffering aphasia or lack of speech after a stroke or head injury, as well as the accompanying physical disabilities. There are many in Cambridgeshire, maybe living near you, or part of your family or circle of friends. You will realise how difficult life can be if you find it hard to make yourself understood. To go out in public is daunting, but even at home, lacking any degree of fluent speech is a most frustrating experience.

There is a Group, Speakability Huntingdon, which exists solely as a self-help social group for those suffering aphasia and their carers and families. We are an affiliated group of the 30 year old national charity, Speakability, which provides a free phone helpline, useful leaflets and books and even training as well as a website.

Speakability Huntingdon meets on the second Tuesday of the month, usually at the Medway Centre, Huntingdon, from 1.45-3.45pm. Anyone who has speech difficulties or cares for someone who does is most welcome to join us. We are informal and friendly and meet to enjoy games, quizzes and chat with refreshments. Carers may, if they wish, use another part of the Medway Centre for a little respite with tea or coffee and the opportunity to talk with people in a similar position. Volunteers or carers will organise activities for the rest of the group. Occasionally we invite a speaker for the afternoon, from organisations such as Trading Standards or the Woodland Trust. We take any and every excuse to have a celebration, be it a birthday, anniversary, or Valentines Day, and we hold a large public Tea Party in October to which we invite all the local Mayors, and any other interested organisations.

Every third month we go out for lunch at a pub or interesting venue: garden centres, the Raptor Foundation and Grafham Water have hosted us in the past. These enjoyable afternoons usually last from midday to about 3.00pm

Anyone may refer a potential member to us, doctors, Hinchingbrooke Hospital Speech and Language Therapy Department, social workers, the Carers Support Team, the Stroke Association, friends or family. Please ring me on 01480 891977 for more information.



To the Glorious Memory (Eaton Socon War Memorial)

This year we produced a book about the lives and families of the soldiers listed on the Eaton Socon War Memorial and those linked to Eaton Socon Parish. This book contains information on more than 120 soldiers, and what happened to their families before and after the two World Wars. Read about the agricultural labourers who went off to fight and die abroad, the men born in Ireland, Moscow and those who were born into families owning land and property. Find out about the young men who emigrated to Canada from Eaton Socon and are listed in the Peace Tower in Ottawa, and the men who died in India and the Far East. Whether you are an old Eaton family or new to the area this book is of interest to everyone.

Eatons Community Centre

This new centre in the Eatons is now open and if you have had a chance to look around there is a large hall and a variety of smaller rooms. In April the rooms upstairs were named after our local hero, Matthew Rosamond, who won one of the very first Victoria Crosses. Matthew grew up in Eaton Socon in a poor family, joined the Indian Army and won the Victoria Cross during the Indian Mutiny. An achievement we should all be proud of.



Are you older than Eaton Socon Church?

This is not a trick question. Eighty years ago, in February 1930, the church burnt down and was left with no roof and very little standing masonry. During the next two years there was a great deal of fund raising and many men worked to rebuild the church and in June 1932 the church was rededicated. So the 'new' church celebrated its 78th birthday this June.

So are you older than the church?
