
We have lots of fun and we have social evenings as well.

The Pightle Millennium Green - Eaton Socon

It does not seem that long since I sat down to write the last article for the ESCAN magazine, however quite a lot has occurred since my last contribution.

The Pightle, which means small field or enclosure, was purchased for the people of Eaton Socon in 1999 as a Millennium Green. The land was purchased at a time when there was talk of developing the Bedfordia Fields (the cow field). By purchasing the land and placing it in Trust meant the people of Eaton Socon would have permanent green access to the River Ouse, irrespective of any future housing developments. The Town Council was one of three purchasers of the land, and since the purchase they have helped enormously with funding, advice and with some of the maintenance. The Pightle is managed by a small group of Trustees who work hard to maintain the area as a natural green open space.

Since 1999 the Pightle has received funding from the Town Council, which has allowed the Trustees to insure the Pightle and employ individuals to cut the meadow grass and another group to come in and carry out basic maintenance of the Pightle. Unfortunately this year the grant has been reduced considerably and the Pightle trustees have only been allocated a maximum of £300 which must be used towards a new gate.

Fortunately, we have enough funds to see us through until the end of this year, but once we have paid the years insurance we have very little money left. We are now actively searching for funding and have been given advice from Helen King, the Town Clerk, and other local experts and we are hopeful that some of the leads we have will prove fruitful in helping us to gain future funding.

The funding crisis has helped to highlight the desperate shortage of volunteers we have to call upon to help with the basic maintenance jobs which need doing in order to stop the Pightle becoming overgrown and the scrub and brambles taking over. So if you use the Pightle and would like to get involved with helping to maintain the space for others then please get in touch with either myself or one of the other Trustees, we would greatly appreciate any help you can give.

On a similar theme we are also looking for people who have any knowledge of flowers, birds or reptiles and would be prepared to help with surveying the site in order to find what the Pightle currently supports during the year and what we may be able to do in order to encourage a wider variety of flora and fauna into the area. These surveys should enable us to see how we can develop the site and draw up a plan for the future management.

Just before we found that our funding was cut we had managed to get the meadow grass cut and BTCV, a Bedford based voluntary group, came in two days later to rake the grass up. Raking the grass prevents the nutrients from going back into the ground, helping to leave the soil nutrient poor, in the hope that a greater variety of wild flowers and grasses will be encouraged over time. This was the first time I had been involved in raking the grass and I was surprised at how long it took just to get the top half of the field raked; nine people working for five and a half hours and we still ran out of time and had to leave the bottom third of the field. The area has never seemed quite as big as it did that day! Though the job was made considerably easier by the sunny weather and good company; I'm not sure what we looked like from outside the Pightle but one of the lads from BTCV was asked if we were gypsies while he was brewing up for lunch!

We also had one of our Trim and Tidy days in September. I'd like to say thank you again to the three people who turned up to help. I have also been spending quite a bit of time at the Pightle over the last few months; cutting back some of the bramble and scrub and also painting the fence. I was hoping to finish getting the fence painted before the cold weather sets in but work and family commitments keep getting in the way, so I will probably finish it next year and spend the winter months tackling some more of the overgrown scrub. I'd like to say a big thank you to Molly who persuaded her Nan to stop and let her help with the painting; she did a fabulous job on the section she helped with, even though she managed to get paint spots all over her new clothes!

I am writing this just as Autumn has arrived, with a few early frosts this week which will help to finish off the last of the Blackberries, which were plentiful this year. Although the frosts probably haven't been hard enough yet, I have been informed that Sloes are at their best once they have been exposed to frost; apparently the frost helps them to soak up the alcohol. Sloes are said to enhance the taste of Gin and while it doesn't appear that you can do much else with Sloes other than put them in Gin, it does appear that once made it can be used as a marinade, in jellies, as a addition to cranberry sauce, or plum pudding, drunk neat or added to cocktails. Apparently if picked now your Sloe Gin will be ready for Christmas and can make an ideal Christmas present.

The Pightle has now launched has its own website, thanks to Julia Hayward. This is a very new development and more information and links will be added as time goes on. The site can be found at http://www.eatonsoconpightle. org.uk/ . We are also planning to set up a 'Friends of the Pightle' scheme – more news will follow on the website soon, and in the next ESCAN.

### **Name that Bridge**

Here is your opportunity to name the new cycle and footbridge. If you can think of a name for the new bridge please let ESCA know by email or by letter. The suggestions will be collected and taken to a meeting in January. The person/persons whose winning name is chosen will be invited to the official opening ceremony so please send us your suggested bridge name with your name and contact details. The bridge name will be decided in time for project boards to go up early next year before construction starts in earnest on site. The latest news is that work will start in early 2011. The land either side of the river will be cleared and sometime

early next year work will begin on the

actual bridge. The latest information is

that the bridge span will have an overall length of about 346 metres. There will be approach ramps on either side of the bridge to make sure it is still usable during normal flooding and the bridge has been designed in agreement with the Environment Agency to ensure the effects of flooding in the area are minimised as much as possible.

The bridge will connect Eaton Socon and Evnesbury. In Eaton Socon the bridge will be sited near the cricket field, just off Shakespeare Rd and footpaths will connect with St Neots Community College, Eynesbury Manor Estate and to Tescos.



Over the years, vast changes have been made to improve and design new, simpler and better equipment for the hard of hearing for use with or without hearing aids.

- Listening devices to help you hear general conversation, the television, radio or hi-fi.
- Alerting equipment such as doorbells, vibrating alarm clocks, baby monitors and smoke alarms.
- Conventional and cordless telephones with amplification and special features will all be on show together with information about how and where to buy.

People undervalue their hearing and often accept these limitations and inconveniences, not knowing that there is a lot of help available at very reasonable prices.

Mike Friend from CAMTAD in Hunts and a team of trained volunteers will be there to assist visitors to make the right choices. CAMTAD will not be selling equipment but will be able to direct visitors to retailers.

This book contains information on more than 120 soldiers, and what happened to their families before and after the two World Wars. Read about the agricultural labourers who


went off to fight and die abroad, the men born in Ireland, Moscow and those who were born into families owning land and property. Find out about the young men who emigrated to Canada from Eaton Socon and are listed in the Peace Tower in Ottawa, and the men who died in India and the Far East. Whether you are an old Eaton family or new to the area this book is of interest to everyone.

#### St Neots and the Great War by Kenneth Wood

The town of St Neots, which includes the three parishes of St Neots, Eynesbury and Eaton Socon, is fortunate that Ken has written this book which details the events of the Great War in chronological order and puts the lives and deaths of local men in their context within the War. More than 180 men from the three parishes lost their lives and Ken has been able to add snippets of life which continued within the local area while the men fought in the battlezones of Europe and beyond.



Ken is a local historian who has led tours

around the battle fields and his knowledge of the Great War provides a deeper understanding of the effect that the War had on the families living within the town of St Neots and its surrounding villages and farms.

Ken's book is written from a completely different viewpoint to the ESCA book and the two books complement each other so for a fuller understanding of the Great War why not buy both.

## The Secret Life of St Neots Station "a microcosm of the world in which we live" by John Slack

Written by a local author, this book on St Neots Railway Station is full of information and illustrations from 1844 to the present. Find out about the building of the railway line, the 3 railway schemes into the town centre, the involvement of Octavius



Wilkinson and how Eaton Socon nearly became the Crewe Junction of the East. Information is given on how industry in the town thrived, including how Paine's Brewery and George Bower's iron foundry flourished, and how one of Bower's products caused a major accident at Offord. Sections chronicle the trials and tribulations of St Neots' commerce from 1850 to the present.

Accounts are given of the Duke of Manchester's use of St Neots Station and the passage of 19th Century royalty through St Neots. A detailed account is given of the Flying Scotsman Express's 1895 crash in the station, and its subsequent Board of Trade Inquiry; how the town responded to the General Strike of 1926; and the people who used the station in WW2 including the SAS.

Illustrations include many award winning photographs taken by Joe Doncaster who worked at the station from 1931 to 1970.
