FRIENDS OF SUDBURY MEADOW

A Trip to Sudbury Meadow by Gill Holt

Next time you park in the Riverside car park, don't just go to the town. Wear some good footwear, pass under the road and turn to your left, cut across the grass towards a willow tree. Walk along the wildlife friendly hedge line with the tall Poplars, and follow around to the left. Here you will find, nearly hidden in the hedge a kissing gate. Go through, you have walked from a tidily mown park into a hidden oasis, managed for wildlife. This is Sudbury Meadow.

You might not think that there is much to see at this time of the year, but Teasels, Knapweed, and Thistles are still in abundance, good food for Goldfinches, one of my favourite birds. Nettles, Bristly Ox-Tongue, and Burdock still show some life, White Dead Nettle and of course Dandelions will take some real frost to subdue them!

Now stroll on, follow the path to the other side of the meadow, there are some mature shrubs here, and information boards to help you identify them. These shrubs are laden with wildlife friendly berries, more than I have seen for a long time, a product of the mild spring that we had. Dogwood, Spindle, Willow, Guelder Rose and Wayfaring Tree are all putting on a show of autumn colour. My little dog, "Sparky", is eating the Cleavers! It was used in herbal medicine as a cleanser. He obviously knows this as he often picks it out to eat! Further round the meadow is a small orchard, the trees have almost lost their leaves now. I helped Alison Pearson (who looks after the meadow) to prune some of these trees, She is always glad to welcome new volunteers to her band of helpers. I have to admit I haven`t had time lately to join them. I litter pick Barford Road Pocket Park regularly as I dog walk, and volunteer there, as it is nearer to home. If everyone picked up one piece of litter everywhere would be tidy, or better still didn't drop it in the first place, and don't get me on dog mess, or we'll be here forever!

As you walk past the fruit trees you will see that many have labels, and are more unusual varieties. There must have been a good crop this year, with plenty left on the ground for the wildlife. You have now followed the path to the road side of the meadow where it becomes a more formal area. Small raised beds still have some Runner beans standing, and some Peppers too! Another bed has Borage and it has had babies, lots more for next year! There are more herbs in the next bed and still some flowers in another. Even a Dahlia with flowers, one good frost and they will all be gone!

As you walk on you will see more beds, many plants are still in flower, and there are labels to tell you their names. You can see here a good example of living Willow hedges, which are growing well and will be woven in during the winter, another job for volunteers along with a bit of weeding and tidying.

Then on we walk to a little pergola with a seat, a place to sit and contemplate. Although I wish I hadn`t sat down as the seat was wet! I can never sit long in a garden as I always spot something to do, and now I have spotted a new feature. A raised alpine bed, which is intriguingly made from stout old pallets! How clever!

Well I am afraid we have to leave this tranquil part of Sudbury Meadow, we have arrived at the main entrance in Crosshall Road where there is an information board to tell you all about the area and its wildlife, but why not discover it for yourself, as I did, by the back door!



Bulb planting

Yes, ESCA have been out and about once again planting bulbs and shrubs. First came the shrubs planted in two flowerbeds in the Eaton Socon Churchyard with the brownies helping. More shrubs will be planted next spring. Next came several ESCA committee members planting daffodil bulbs in the churchyard beds and along the pathway leading to Willow Bridge. Poppy seeds have also been scattered and we all hope for a fantastic display next spring and summer. The shrubs and some bulbs were supplied by ESCA who raise money for plants supplying refreshments at Sinfonia and Choral Society Concerts at Eaton Socon Church. The Town Council also kindly supplied two large bags of daffodil bulbs.

Why not collect a bag of leaves from your road or elsewhere in the Eatons and put them in your compost bin – great mulch for the next Year – free and you will help to keep the paths from becoming slippery.

We have recently had both financial and advisory support from the Town Council and Ed Reilly the new Acting Town Clerk, for which we are very grateful.

Re-ablement

Being independent following an operation or illness If you or someone you care for requires social care support following an illness or operation, this would traditionally have been provided by a care assistant providing direct care to the person in need.

Since September 2010 a new service, re-ablement, has been providing support to enable older people who have poor physical or mental health following illness or an operation to live in their own homes.

Re-ablement programmes can last for as little as a few days and generally don't exceed six weeks. The ethos of re-ablement is to encourage people to do things for themselves rather than having things done for them. There is no charge to the individual as long as they are participating in the programme.

Re-ablement is now being offered to a wider client group including new service users with a physical disability and new occupational therapy referrals. Future development of the service will look at assisting older people who already have a care package but due to illness or physical issues may now require a higher level of support.

"The St. Neots Freecycle[™] group is open to all who want to "recycle" that special something rather than throw it away. Whether it's a chair,

a fax machine, piano or an old door, feel free to post it. Or maybe you're looking to acquire something yourself! Nonprofit groups are also welcome to participate too!"

Freecycle is an email group you sign up to over the Internet. There are groups based all over the UK, and the one for the St Neots area can be found at http:// groups.yahoo.com/group/stneotsfreecycle/ The idea is for members to offer stuff to other members – all local people - for free, instead of sending it to the tip or leaving it gathering dust. I've found Freecycle invaluable for stuff that is inconvenient to sell, and not worth much, but still useful to somebody, like old furniture, toys, clothes and building materials. For instance, I had an old trampoline which needed a lot of work to be sellable, so instead, I put it on Freecycle. A lovely family collected it: I got my lawn back with zero effort, and they got a bargain. Win, win! And there's an added benefit, through Freecycle we've met many interesting people in our community who we might never have done otherwise.




The book on St Neots Railway
