Bus Services – your chance to get involved

The St Neots Area Bus Users Society is a young group to represent passengers in and around St Neots and surrounding villages. Two months in and already there are some positive signs — we've got the County Council to survey the location for a permanent bus stop at the Barley Mow, and are working with the Town Council to maintain stocks of pocket timetables at suitable locations. Now, on the horizon is a major consultation for Cambridgeshire Future Transport, a £1.5million fund which could be used to help provide bus services or alternatives such as car-sharing schemes. Problems with buses!

If you are one of the people who have been left stranded with no buses and cannot easily do essential journeys like the dentists, doctors and shopping then there are people who may be able to



help you. The St Neots Volunteer Centre have drivers who will come and pick you up and take you to where you need to go. There are conditions attached and a small fee will be requested to cover petrol costs so why not pick up your phone and phone 01480 476047 to find out more. This may be a solution for you, especially if you have mobility problems. Advance notice usually needed. If you are a driver and would like to help others you can also contact the Volunteer Centre. More drivers are always needed.

Other schemes include the Nene and Ouse Valley Dial-a-Ride Community Transport which offer a similar service but require a yearly subscription which will also entitle you to outings arranged by them – Tel 01832 733336 for more information. A little brush along the pavement after mowing and perhaps clearing a little litter caught in a nearby bush will keep the Eatons tidier and will hopefully encourage others to look after their gardens and roads. We all know how we feel when we see a scruffy street or a tidy street. Let us all be proud of the Eatons.



'Bringing wildlife closer to home'

I have no doubt that the birds, animals and creepy crawlies of Sudbury Meadow are enjoying the fact that most of our meadow remains uncut. We did try! On 3rd October, we had it all planned out. Countryside Services ranger, Matt Hall, brought along the equipment and his Paxton Pits volunteers to cut all the meadow. We hired a skip and all started well. However, the reciprocator cutter was playing up and couldn't cut the tough stems, one of

the brush cutters broke down and the vehicle used to transport all the equipment also broke down! We managed to get about two-thirds of the lower meadow cut and completely filled the skip. Still, its supposed to be good practice to leave areas uncut over winter - that's now our excuse!



One plan that did work out was to help St Neots Town Council trial a plant recycling scheme for some of the summer bedding plants. Most of the bedding plants were annuals so would not survive the winter, but various dahlias, Verbena bonariensis and a few borderline rudbeckias along with 3 sacks of geraniums were delivered to Sudbury Meadow for people to collect on 20th October. We were a bit surprised by the rush of keen gardeners in the first 30 minutes! By midday all the dahlias and most of the verbena and rudbeckais had found new homes. The geraniums were not so lucky, but some have since found a home too. Friends of Sudbury Meadow received £101 in donations (not St Neots in Bloom as reported in the News and Crier!) for which we are very grateful. Look out for future plant giveaways. Many of our green spaces rely on volunteers to survive and Sudbury Meadow is no exception. Do get in touch if you have a few hours to spare and think you might be able to help. The site is open all year round if you want to explore further. If you have still not found Sudbury Meadow then cross the road from the Barley Mow in Eaton Ford and look for the wildlife area just north of 6 Crosshall Road.

Planting bulbs by the volunteers

Autumn is well underway now, and now that the second cutting is finished and done the Pightle itself looks like it is settling down ready for colder times ahead. The berries haven't had the best of years, and sadly this is likely to have an impact on the birds who hope for some as a tasty meal. However, there's plenty of activity going on as we work our way through the various projects that are being funded by our grant from the AmeyCespa Landfill Fund.

We already have two new benches in place. One overlooks the riverbank to the north of the older bench in the Pightle and the other faces our Celebration Trees. We hope you'll take the opportunity to enjoy two of our favourite spots. By the time you read this, our volunteers will have planted up hundreds of native English bulbs - bluebells, aconites, anemones and snowdrops - as well as a wide variety of wild flower seeds ready for a glorious show of colour in 2013. The artwork for our new information boards is now complete and the boards themselves are now being prepared ready for installation before the end of the year; I'm sure you will agree they are a fantastic addition when you see them.

There's also more mundane work going on, with the path leading out to the Cricket Club being smoothed and made less steep, and the kissing gate being reworked to improve access for disabled scooters. It might not be as visible, but it's very important to us that the Pightle can be enjoyed by the whole community. We've also ordered bird-boxes and bat-boxes and will be involving local children in assembling them and putting them up ready for their new residents to move in come the spring.

Finally, you may be aware that the Pightle is host to a collection of Black Poplars; long associated with the area and once cultivated for its wood because of its long, dead-straight trunk, there are as few as 6400 males and 600 females left in the UK. We're delighted to be able to provide a female sapling and this has just been planted near the Willow Bridge, hopefully ensuring our connection with this wonderful species for years to come.

Have you ever wondered what wool can be used for?

Jeannette Cadney, of St Neots Trefoil Guild, a branch of the Girl Guides who support local guiding, collects wool which is very gratefully received by ladies who then spend many hours knitting to help others.

The wool is distributed amongst members of the Girl Guides, including the Trefoil Guild, who make small garments and blankets to go SANGAM in India. Any that is not suitable for knitting is given to local craft groups

SANGAM is one of the four World Association Centres in Pune, India (approx 120 miles south east of Mumbai) and members and staff support various charities in the surrounding area. Each Guiding group that goes there takes as many items that they can fit into their luggage for distribution later. A group in August took the garments and blankets, which had been knitted over many months. The Airline was very generous and each member of the group was allowed two bags.

Jeannette has been to Sangam twice and visited the Family Welfare Centre, which supports up to 60,000 people in three slums. On her second visit she was also able to visit a Leper Colony and see how various organizations had helped them.

Jeannette would like to say a big thank you for all the wool received and send another plea for wool. It will always be well used so if you have some spare wool please let ESCA know and we will pass it on.

Cambridgeshire Future Transport is a public engagement programme involving residents in designing local transport solutions for their area. Over the next three years the Council will be reviewing how subsidised bus services are delivered across the whole county. Budget cuts to transport provision in the county mean that the Council's investment will now need to go further. There will be £1.5 million across the county to run a service, alongside commercial routes, that takes as many people as possible where they want to go, when they want to go.

It may be that the familiar scheduled bus is no longer the best solution for your area. Groups are being encouraged to explore a range of alternatives including: pre-bookable mini buses, like Dial-a-Ride; volunteer car schemes; taxi-card schemes; and car sharing schemes. Changes will only be made after a period of consultation.

Services in your area are not scheduled for review until Spring next year and any solutions will not be introduced until April 2014.
