St Mary's Eaton Socon "Bell Restoration" Project

In 1932, St Mary's Eaton Socon Bells were rehung following the great fire two years earlier. Over the past 80 years, these bells have played an important part in reminding the community of the Church's presence and helping people to celebrate various Life events.

During this time, the Bells have not received any professional maintenance – and now the time has come where, due to 'normal wear and tear, the Bells require a complete overhaul to ensure they continue sounding out in the community for the decades to come.

Because Churches are self-funding Charities and do not receive any Government support (except Income Tax reclaim), we would like to invite YOU to support this exciting project.

This work will cost approximately £13,000 (£1625 per bell).

Only with your support can we together enable the Bells to continue playing an important role in the life of our community. (If you are a taxpayer, we are able to reclaim an additional 25p for every £1 you donate.)

The Pightle Millennium Green Eaton Socon

In the last ESCAN I was looking forward to a colourful time ahead and although most things are running late this year, with a warm and sunny time since Easter we have certainly been well rewarded. Early spring bulbs such as daffodils and bluebells have since given way to wild meadow flowers such as field scabious and cranesbill. And our new bed along the main fence, which earlier in the year looked like a rather sorry dead strip of grass, is awash with cornflower, tansy, poppies and more.

A careful walk round should reveal thirty or more species, and we are still discovering and identifying the occasional newcomer such as Common Broomrape. Keep an eye on our noticeboard, where we're putting up pictures of the flowers of the season, together with their interesting stories - most were encouraged to grow in centuries past not just because they looked beautiful, but also were believed to be good for our ancestors in some way.



The wild flowers bring plenty of visitors to the Pightle, especially bees. You should have no problem finding them working away; honeybees from nearby hives, solitary bees who have moved into our purposebuilt bee-boxes tucked away in sheltered corners, and the unmistakable bumblebees. All have had difficult times recently; the well-publicised problems of pesticides and parasites combined with windy, rainy summers reduced their numbers. But we're certainly seeing more



this year. And if you wonder why we don't systematically remove dead trees and fallen wood in some areas of the Pightle, it's because they provide plenty of natural hidey-holes for the wild bees to hibernate in. As an aside, did you know bees can see ultraviolet colours that we can't? Many flowers that look like a single plain colour to us are brightly patterned to them, just begging them to come and visit.

We were very saddened to have one of our commemoration trees vandalised over the summer; a young rowan that had been carefully tended for over a decade, crudely hacked down in an attempt to make firewood. Hopefully it will survive and we'll do everything we can to

help it. Thank you to everyone who has sent in messages of support and encouragement. Many were not aware that we do this - subject to there being enough room, if you would like a native English tree to be planted to mark the life of a loved one or a significant anniversary, please do get in touch.

The library has 8 computers in their upstairs learning suite staffed by two volunteers where you will always be made most welcome.




